Dr. Mike Taylor —
Mass Rocks & Hedge
Schools: Benedictine
Hallmarks of Colonial
Resistance

Mass Rocks and Hedge Schools in Ireland north and south emerged during oppressive times in Ireland manifested at the hands of colonialism by the British Government through Penal Laws essentially banning worship and education. Historically, Benedictine communities like Holy Cross Abbey in Rostrevor Northern Ireland, and Glenstal Abbey near Limerick in the Republic of Ireland, have been allies in aiding the oppressed engaged in colonial, along with more recent efforts for peace and reconciliation encapsulated in Christian unity. The purpose of this presentation is to share several years of service-learning abroad experiences in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland with students and faculty at the University of Mary.

Finally, Dr. Taylor will explain how shared trip experiences using examples such as Mass Rocks and Hedge Schools — can adapt these signs of colonial resistance as models of disciplined, Benedictine values, of a way toward learning and freedom with hopeful emancipation in their own general and teaching contexts and communities.

The presentation by Dr. Taylor will follow the usual retreat schedule 10am-3 pm
